B. Program Information Summary

The program is at full enrollment. There have been some changes with transportation routing and minimal changes to program option choices for families.

Director submitted the PIR prior to the August 31st due date with the assistance of the IT Secretary. The Director submitted the baseline application for Year 1 of the 5- year project period 19-24. As of this report, there has been no communication with OHS regarding the grant application.

August was filled with orientation for returning employees, new employees, and children and families. Direct service staff returned to work throughout the month. Several training

opportunities were afforded to staff. Education staff attended onsite Conscious Discipline training. Two Head Teachers attended Conscious Discipline training through OHSAI. All staff attending in-service that focused on building our School Family, communication, and mental health.

Several new employees began the school year: Tracy Brewer (HT), Cynarra Yaney (TA), Cyndi Bowsher (long-term sub), Debbie Hurles (TA), and Rosita Edejer (TA). The program is excited to welcome all new employees. Mrs. Edejer is a Marshallese speaking teacher to support our Marshallese population.

August 21 was the first day of our Full Day PreK program afforded to us through the Duration grant.

Director's Message

Over 40 years ago, Mercer County Head Start began serving children and families in the Education Complex on Livingston Avenue in Celina, Ohio. In August 2017, MCHS re-opened classrooms in the Education Complex and redefined relationships with state-funded early childhood programming with Celina City Schools. Along with the traditional half-day preschool programming, MCHS was able to provide much-needed full-day programming as well. While we returned to our roots we are always looking forward into the future.

Building relationships and connecting with others is the cornerstone of success in early childhood. Children learn to develop these skills through cooperative play which later presents as problem-solving, and later in life displays itself in creative thinking. Mercer County Head Start has used this same philosophy to build relationships with various partners in the community to continue to create innovative services for children and families. Mercer County Education Services Center and Celina City Schools are examples of exemplar partnerships. Together through shared resources and funding, collaboratively we have been able to serve children with special needs in the least restrictive environment with low teacher to child ratios. Our on-going partnership with Foundations Behavioral Health has allowed children to receive much-needed behavioral and mental health services on-site and decreased wait time for those services.

Mercer County Head Start has embraced *Conscious Discipline* as the program's social emotional curriculum and way of doing business. All children, families, and staff are integral members of our Head Start School Family. The School Family increases connections between adults and children at all levels, ensuring optimal development and learning for all (https://consciousdiscipline.com/methodology/). Data indicates that classrooms that thoroughly integrate all aspects of *Conscious Discipline* experience decreased behavioral issues and increased attendance.

Mercer County Head Start receives funds primarily from the Administration of Children & Families through the Office of Head Start. The program receives supplemental funds provided by the Child and Adult Care Food program (CACFP). Non-federal match or in-kind resources must constitute 20% of the federal grant. Each year we are able to meet this requirement through the gracious support of local volunteers, parents, and supporters.

Mercer County Head Start's last federal review took place in 201. There were no findings.

This annual report provides a review of the 2017-18 program year. This was our first year offering full-day services (1,020 instructional hours) to children at the Celina location. Our satellite site located at New Horizons Church in Rockford, Ohio has been offering full-day programming for the past 4 years. Our annual report will provide you with a glimpse of the wonderful activities and achievements we see daily at the center. We encourage you to visit our site and see first-hand the impacts we have on children, families, and our community.

Head Start's model of shared governance is comprised of two entities: Celina City Schools Board of Education (elected by the Celina City School District Community) and Mercer County Head Start's Policy Council (parents elected by the Head Start peers). This model ensures that parents have an equal voice in program planning and decision-making to the Board of Education which holds legal and fiduciary responsibility of the program. Together, this shared-governance body provide guidance and oversight to the Executive Director.

Parents participate in other forms of leadership activities in Head Start. Some examples include POPs (Parents of Preschoolers), classroom volunteers, and Parent Ambassador.

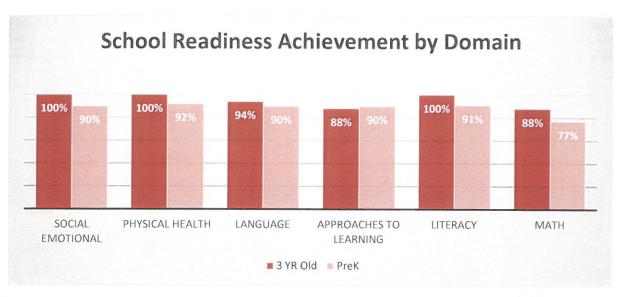
School Readiness

Each intentional lesson throughout our daily lives is preparing our children to be ready to learn. This is how Mercer County Head Start approaches school readiness. Entering kindergarten requires far more skills than knowing the alphabet or how to count. While those skills are important, our goal is to illuminate the joy of learning in each child. Children are as unique as the snowflakes that fall from the sky on a beautiful winter day. Each created and influenced by their experiences. Our purpose is to intentionally create an environment whereas the uniqueness of every child is honored. Children are afforded the opportunity to learn through hands-on experiences. Teachers encourage the exploration and curiosity brimming within. We partner with parents to bridge learning at the center with learning in the home. Parents are their child's first and primary educator. Our role as teachers is to support our parents to be the best teacher for their child.

During PY 17/18, our parents spent 35,555 minutes on at-home learning activities with their children. This is 62% increase from the year before. One hundred percent of our families participated in parent teacher conferences!

Mercer County Head Start utilizes *Creative Curriculum* and *Conscious Discipline* as our primary curricula. The assessment tool in which we assess the progress of children is *Teaching Strategies GOLD*. This assessment tool is aligned with the Head Start Early Learning Framework (HSELOF) and the Ohio Department of Education Development Standards. Within the assessment are measurement tools referenced as "widely-held expectations". These criteria and benchmarks indicate if a child is below, meeting, or exceeding average benchmarks of the same developmental age. Mercer County Head Start established school readiness goals encompassing the areas of Social Emotional Development, Physical Health Development, Language Development, Literacy, Math, and Approaches to Learning.

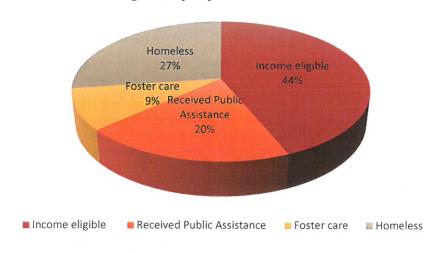
The following table demonstrates the overall achievement for 3-year-old and PreK children.



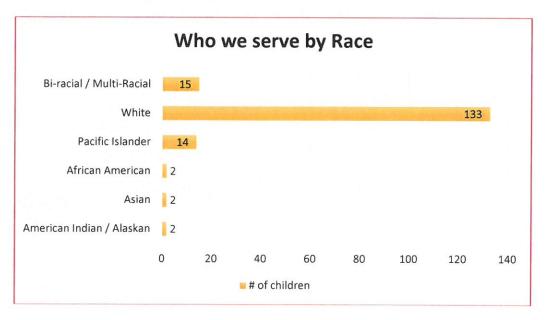
Our Children and Families

Mercer County Head Start served 168 children in PY 17/18. This includes 154 unique families. Children who were categorically eligible or income-eligible comprised 79% of our population.

Average monthly enrollment for PY 17/18 was 147 or 93% Average monthly attendance for PY 17/18 was 87%.



Family Engagement

"At the end of the day, the most overwhelming key to a child's success is the positive involvement of parents." – Jane D. Hull

Family engagement is one of the most difficult factors to measure. We know that with family engagement in our centers our children thrive; without it children do not perform as well as they could. Mercer County Head Start strives to empower and educate parents to increase the parent's understanding of their role as their child's first and most important teacher. In PY 17/18 we provided a variety of opportunities for parents and children to engage in various forms of learning. These include: Kindergarten Readiness and Transition Activities for the Family, How Children Learn Through Play, Family & Child Literacy, Financial Literacy for adults, Safety in and Outside of the Home, I am Moving I am Learning, and Family Bowling Night.

Our community has become home to families from the Marshall Islands. Each year, more and more Marshallese children are enrolled in our programs. To support the Marshallese transition into our community we host a Marshallese culture night where we can learn more about their culture as they learn more about our culture.

Health & Well-Being

Mercer County Head Start has championed the fight to educate families on the importance of preventative healthcare. Our registered nurse meets individually with families to discuss the importance of healthy lifestyle choices, immunizations, and physical activity. Our local partners including Mercer County Health District, Mercer Health, and various pediatricians and mental health providers support us in this journey.

In PY 17/18, 99% of all children had a physical examination which met the requirements for preschool licensing.

74% of all children received a dental examination. Eighteen children were identified as needing additional follow up; of which 55% received the needed treatment.

When analyzing the reasons for such a low follow up number the answer lies with the lack of providers to conduct such treatment in the immediate area.

Budget & Allocation

Mercer County Head Start receives federal dollars from the Administration of Children & Families through the Office of Head Start. To support nutritious meals the program receives federal funding from the Child and Adult Care Food program (CACFP). The CACFP grant is a reimbursement program. Both grants are applied for annually.

Funding allows for the operation of the Head Start program. This includes Salaries, Fringe & Benefits, Programming & Supplies, and Training & Technical Assistance.

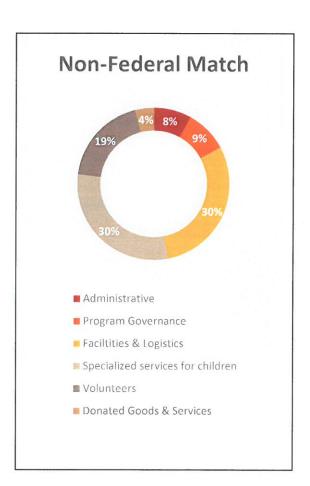

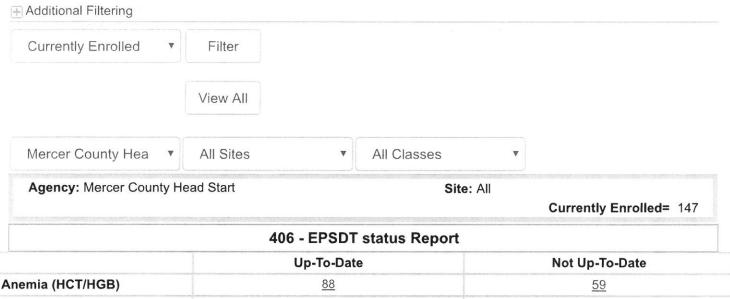
CACFP dollars are utilized for the purchase, preparation, and distribution of high-quality nutritious meals for children. The grantee received \$84, 843.

Non-Federal Match

Head Start programs are required to match 20% of the federal award with non-federal resources. These dollars come in goods and services provided to the program at no cost. The table to the right provides a visual illustration of the sources of non-federal match.

Fiscal Audit 17/18 reported no finding with the Head Start grant. The report from the Auditor of the State reads, "In our opinion, Celina City School District complied, in all material respects with the compliance requirements referred to above that could directly and materially affect each of it major federal programs for the year ended June, 2018". The report also acknowledged that previous findings in the 2016/17 audit had been corrected. Additionally, the report indicates that Celina City Schools does not file GAAP financial statements, but in compliance with ORC files OCBOA financial statements.

Cognitive and General Knowledge: Children will develop fundamental mathematical skills through exploration and intentional learning opportunities in their everyday environment.

Child understands the relationship between numbers and quantities. (P- MATH - 3).

Teaching Strategies Assessment alignment: 20c. Connects numerals with quantities – Green bands – 4, Blue bands – 6.

ODE Standards – Understands that the last number spoken tells the number of objects counted. Demonstrates one-to-one correspondence.
