

Quick Facts on Ohio's Common Core State Standards

Common Core Standards

- Ohio HB 1 in 2009 required the State Board of Education to adopt new standards.
- The Common Core standards were developed by states, not the federal government.
- Ohio voluntarily adopted the Common Core standards in math and English as part of Ohio's New Learning standards. Ohio also created new standards in science and social studies that are <u>not</u> part of the Common Core standards.
- Standards set goals for what students should know and be able to do at each grade. Standards do not tell teachers *how* to teach that's what curriculum does.
- Curriculum is created by teachers, principals, superintendents and local school boards and tailored to the individual needs of the students in their community.
- Educators from 45 states, including Ohio, chose to work together to create higher learning expectations for our students, resulting in the Common Core standards.
- The Common Core standards will give teachers more freedom to focus on the most important topics.
- There is no Common Core curriculum or required state curriculum.

Local Independence

- Ohio's long history of local control is preserved. Parents, students and teachers maintain the right to make individual choices about their education.
- The development of curriculum and lesson plans along with the selection of textbooks or other instructional materials remains a local choice.

Data Privacy

- The Common Core standards <u>do not</u> involve any data collection or reporting.
- Ohio protects the privacy of its students and does not report student specific data to the federal government or sell student data to private interests.
